






# Community Curator: TV Dinner

May 11, 7-9pm



TV Dinner was the media task force of Rochester's Metro Justice for more than two decades, and helped chronicle many of Metro Justice's concerns and activities. including racial justice, reproductive choice, utility issues, and the ongoing struggle for universal healthcare. Founded in 1987, TV Dinner ran video training workshops, film screenings, community art events and organized a weekly cable access television program.

In Summer 2022, Metro Justice gifted the TV Dinner archive to VSW. This extensive collection of over 1,200 videotapes include produced programs, community reports, documentation of civic events, speeches, rallies, confrontations and celebrations created and collected by Metro Justice members. This program features selections from the TV Dinner archive selected and presented by original TV Dinner producers Ruth Cowing. Nancy Rosin, and Maria Scipione.

Central American Days of Protest (1985)

Ruth Cowing has worked in film/video/ photography/publications for over 40 years. She has worked at Afterimage, TV DINNER, City Newspaper, and as Festival Director/Co-Programmer at the High Falls Film Festival. She co-founded/co-directed the Reel Mind Theatre & Film Series and the Rochester Int'l Children's Film Festival. She is currently the Director of Communications at Spiritus Christi Church.

Nancy Rosin is an activist and videographer who spent over 40 years documenting the work of numerous progressive political movements in Rochester NY. In addition to her involvement with Portable Channel, TV Dinner and a number of early feminist groups, she is the author of a history of the Rochester Public Market.

Maria Scipione has been an activist in Rochester since moving here in 1977. She was the organizer for then Metro Act in the late 80s. She currently is an actor, director, and teacher. She works at The Harley School and the College at Brockport.

In 2017, Seno presented a program of Experimental Film and Video from the Philippines in the VSW Film Series, and she has returned to VSW in 2023 as Project Space resident. Seno is an artist and filmmaker whose work addresses memory, history, and image-making, often in relation to the idea of home.

This Arcade 4Walls edition was a commissioned piece originally installed on the media facade of the Asia Culture Center building in Gwangju, South Korea.

Inspired by family hearsay, this film is also a homage to the Pancit Western — the Filipino counterpart of the Spaghetti Western.



Shireen Seno is an artist and filmmaker whose work addresses memory, history, and image-making, often in relation to the idea of home. A recipient of the 2018 Thirteen Artists Award from the Cultural Center of the Philippines, she is known for her films which have won awards at Rotterdam, Punto de Vista, Shanghai, Olhar de Cinema, Vladivostok, Jogja-Netpac, and Lima Independiente and have screened at such festivals as New Directors/New Films, Yebisu International Festival of Art & Alternative Visions, Rencontres Internationales Paris/Berlin, and institutions including Tate Modern, UCCA Center for Contemporary Art, Portikus, NTU Center for Contemporary Art Singapore, Taipei National Center for Photography and Images, Museum of the Moving Image, National Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art (MMCA), Seoul, Museum of Contemporary Art & Design Manila, and MAIIAM Contemporary Art Museum, Chiang Mai. Seno is a 2022 Film Fellow of the DAAD Artists-in-Berlin program.

#### **Program**

Through the Looking Glass, Yi Cui, 2017 (14 min)
On a high-land Tibetan pasture, a screening event
unfolds quietly. Monks, herdsmen and their families
gather by the screen to observe life captured
through their own lenses.

#### Yak Dung, Dhazey, 2016 (45 min)

Young Tibetan herdsman Dhazey takes the viewers on a special tour full of pleasant surprises: how Tibetans cannot live without yak dung. With temperatures falling as low as minus 40oC on the Tibetan plateau, yak dung is a valuable heating source for herdsmen. A non-polluting fuel, it is used to burn offerings to the gods and to light oil lamps. Children make toys out of yak dung, while artists sometimes sculpt figurines of the Buddha with it. It is also used in construction and in medicine.

#### The Tourists, Dhukar Kyab, 2017 (16 min)

A group of Tibetans are guiding tourists through the beautiful land of Nyanpo Yuzee. One of them, the young herdsman Dhukar Kyab, curiously observed the interaction between the locals and the outsiders through the lens of his video camera.


Yi Cui (China/USA) is a filmmaker and educator whose poetic films combine traditions of essay, ethnography and experimental filmmaking. Cui spent several years in Tibet working with the filmmaking program "From Our Eyes" which supports indigenous communities to produce auto-ethnographic films. This program presents a selection of short films made by Tibetan filmmakers reflecting upon daily life, as well as Cui's own films about her experiences working among monks, herdsmen and their families on a highland Tibetan pasture.


Video games are as queer as their makers. Video games are as queer as their players. Queer video games have always existed. I agree with games critic Bo Ruberg when they write that "queer" does not denote gay lifestyles or gay sex but refers to a "challenge to dominant beliefs about pleasure and power."

Some of the games included in this event explicitly refer to queer experience, and some don't. What is a common thread however is that each game pushes on or against the assumptions of what video games are - how they are made and how they are played.

Many of the games are made with accessible game-making tools like Bitsy and RPGMaker, userfriendly tools that allow folks to jump right into making. For the past decade, tools like Bitsy and Twine have broken barriers between artists and game making. Artists like alienmelon and mark wonnacott and communities like glorious trainwrecks continue to open new paths through the old fortress often referred to as "Game Development." Itch. io, where many of these games are hosted, allows small games artists to move away from traditional, restrictive online platforms like Steam and IRL stores like GameStop (RIP), which require a "publisher" such as Nintendo to get into. It may not always be this way, but at the moment, Itch.io is closely related to the zine fair or maybe the flea market.

sraëka-lillian's -Pangea's Error-, made in RPGMaker, is an intense meditation on orientation with nods toward a form of decolonialism. Similarly, lotus' -dandelions- was also made in RPGMaker, and is experienced as longform RPG poetry about "trying to be in the world." The renaissance of small games tools could perhaps be understood to run parallel to the introduction of Super 8 or the Portapack, tools designed to be for more people with smaller budgets (here, these tools are often freeware). velvet's -Take A Piss Like A Woman- was made in Bitsy, and exemplifies what makes Bitsy so valuable: the ability to create short, personal games quickly and to get them out into the world.



#### Father

#### Bonnie Klein/Portable Channel, 14m (1975)

A portrait of the filmmaker's husband as a father reflecting contemporary concerns about the confusing impact of feminism on family relationships.

#### Photographs from My Father

#### Kelly Gallagher, 14m (2014)

An animated and found footage personal essay film, exploring the relationship between my Father and Uncle, amid old photographs and sports stories. A preservation of memories and example of self care through art production.

#### My Gossip

#### Kelly Gallagher, 15m (2019)

Incorporating live-action stop-motion and digital animation, this personal documentary colorfully explores the radical importance of women's close friendships by examining the filmmaker's relationship with her own best friend, and how women's close friendships were historically weaponized against them.

#### Women on Women (excerpt)

#### Women's Television Project/Portable Channel, 6m (1973)

The first program of Portable Channel's Women's Television Project, whose members came together to make videotapes expressing positive, alternative images of women.

#### SMUT Postering Project (excerpt)

Behind the scenes footage of an action organized by Women Against Violence Against Women in Rochester, NY in 1977.

#### Pine and Genesee

#### Kelly Gallagher, 3m (2020)

Charles McGill, Clarence Graham, Sanford Rockowitz/Portable Channel, 8m (1971) Interview with former Attica Prison inmate on conditions, events leading to rebellion and re-taking of prison.

#### We Had Each Other

#### Kelly Gallagher, 15m (2021)

A group of powerful, bold, Irish women political prisoners at Armagh Jail shook Ireland to its' core in 1980 when they began a transgressive "nowash" protest, refusing to bathe for a year to bring attention to their plight and the abusive mistreatment of Irish political prisoners by the British government.

Kelly Gallagher is a filmmaker, animator, and Associate Professor of Film at Syracuse University. Her handcrafted films and commissioned animations have screened at venues including: the Museum of Modern Art, the National Gallery of Art, Sundance Film Festival, Tribeca Film Festival, and the Smithsonian Institution. Recent commissioned animations have screened on Netflix and PBS. Her latest film, WE HAD EACH OTHER, about the strength and solidarity of Irish Republican POW women, won the Research Award at the 2022 Athens International Film and Video Festival. Kelly enthusiastically organizes and facilitates fun and inclusive film workshops and camps for communities of all ages, from Kentucky to California, from New York to Iowa and beyond.

Josh Tonies is an artist who works with drawing and the moving image. His work centers around temporary ecological studies that take form as animation, drawing, works on paper and book arts. He is a lecturer on record at University of San Diego and UC San Diego, teaching courses in film, video art, animation and studio arts. He has exhibited his work most recently at Yerba Buena Center for the Arts in San Francisco, Musée d'Art Contemporain de Montréal, The Center for Fiction in NYC, Comfort Station in Chicago Illinois and the San Diego Museum of Art.




# Wavelength:

A Tribute to Michael Snow

February 2, 2023, 7pm

On Thursday, January 5th, artist Michael Snow died at the age of 94. Snow was a prolific book artist, painter, musician, filmmaker, and sculptor, whose works expanded beyond formal traditions to challenge the expectations of audiences and inspire generations of artists. On Thursday February 2nd, VSW will pay tribute to Snow with a free screening of his 1967 structuralist masterpiece, Wavelength (projected on 16mm film), preceded by a live "reading" of Snow's iconic 1975 artist book, Cover to Cover. Both Wavelength and Cover to Cover are part of the VSW Collections.

Gordon Nelson, Assistant Curator of Digital Collections at the George Eastman Museum, will introduce the film.

- Music The Last LP: Unique Last Recordings Of The Music Of Ancient Cultures (Michael Snow, 1987, Art Metropole)
- Book Cover to Cover (Michael Snow, 1975, Nova Scotia College of Art and Design, 300 pages)
- Film Wavelength (Michael Snow, 1967, US/Canada 43 mins.) Chosen by the Audio-Visual Preservation Trust of Canada to be preserved for future generations in 2006.

"Wavelength was shot in one week in December '66 preceded by a year of notes, thoughts, mutterings. It was edited and the first print was seen in May '67. I wanted to make a summation of my nervous system, religious inklings and aesthetic ideas. I was thinking of planning for a time monument in which the beauty and sadness of equivalence would be celebrated, thinking of trying to make a definitive statement of pure Film space and time, a balancing of 'illusion' and 'fact', all about seeing. The space starts at the camera's (spectator's) eye, is in the air, then is on the screen, then is within the screen (the mind).

The film is a continuous zoom which takes 45 minutes to go from its widest field to its smallest and final field. It was shot with a fixed camera from one end of an 80 foot loft, shooting the other end, a row of windows and the street .... The room (and the zoom) are interrupted by four human events including a death. The sound on these occasions is sync sound, music and speech, occurring simultaneously with an electronic sound, a sine-wave .... It is a total glissando while the film is a crescendo and a dispersed spectrum which attempts to utilize the gifts of both prophecy and memory which only film and music have to offer."

# Salon Spring 2023 Films by Tomonari Nishikawa

February 9, 2023, 7pm Visual Studies Workshop



Filmmaker Tomonari Nishikawa (Japan/USA) will present a program of his experimental Super 8 and 16mm films at the VSW Salon, and discuss his process-based approach to visual and temporal composition. Nishikawa's intricate cinematic technique weaves time and space into graphic patterns, undulating rhythms and colorful forms, resulting in an expansive perceptual experience of often familiar subjects.

Nishikawa's films explore the idea of documenting situations/ phenomena through a chosen medium and technique, often focusing on process itself. His films have been screened at numerous film festivals and art venues, including Berlinale, Edinburgh International Film Festival, Hong Kong International Film Festival, International Film Festival Rotterdam, London Film Festival, Media City Film Festival, New York Film Festival, Singapore International Film Festival, and Toronto International Film Festival. He is one of the co-founders of KLEX: Kuala Lumpur Experimental Film and Video Festival and Transient Visions: Festival of the Moving Image. He lives in Japan/USA, currently teaching in Cinema Department at Binghamton University.

Mono No Aware is a non-profit organization and film positive community working to promote connectivity through the cinematic experience. Based in Brooklyn, NY, Mono No Aware (MNA) presents screenings, organizes affordable analogue filmmaking workshops, facilitates equipment rentals, and hosts an annual exhibition for contemporary artists and international filmmakers whose work incorporates Super 8mm, 16mm, 35mm or altered light projections as part of a live performance or installation. This screening will be presented by members of the MNA film community, including the MNA founder Steve Cossmann, and will feature a selection of recent films made in the MNA workshop.

#### Cellular Reconstruction, 2022 2 min. 16MM w/ OPT SOUND by DERRICK SCHULTZ

Direct manipulation of a faded educational film using traditional and digital technologies. An exploration of themes on conservation and reinvention, both in film and ecology.

## Jacob's House, WIP / 16MM - DIGITAL by LUCAS KANE

Jacob's House is a slow exploration of what constitutes a house and how a house constitutes a way of life. Made collaboratively between two neighborsfilmmaker Lucas Kane and painter Jacob Eye—this film traces Jacob's 15 year relationship to his home and his ongoing resistance to a brutal eviction attempt as a new wave of gentrification sweeps the neighborhood. By prioritizing Jacob's own emphasis on the spiritual nature of this battle, and by focusing on the physicality of the house and its many transformations over the course of this violent eviction, this living document seeks to lay bare the injustices of NYC's housing crisis and open deep and rippling questions on the nature of what is a home.

Lucas Kane is a brooklyn-based film and theater maker, whose work ranges from experimental documentary film to community-based forum theater. For the past year, he's been exploring the ideological underpinnings and political implications of Brecht's learning plays by staging them in collaboration with different Brooklyn based activist groups as a means to facilitate conversation around arts and organizing. Prior to this, she worked as an assistant director to Peter Brook at the Bouffes du Nord theater in Paris. They are currently working on a collaborative and experimental documentary with their neighbors which traces the history of the gentrification of their block and a short diary film about working with Peter Brook and his approach to theater. He also works as the Lab Manager at the cinema non-profit Mono No Aware.

## Container Film, 2023 4 min 16MM to DIGITAL by DENA KOPOLOVICH

Based on various religious, anthropological, and artistic texts, Container Film is a meditation on the idea of the vessel as the first cultural tool. The film uses handmade or organic objects and human bodies to imagine the visible and metaphorical containers that reflect communal relationships and drive humanity forward.

Dena Kopolovich is a multimedia artist & filmmaker from New York. Her recent work uses past and present aesthetics to investigate the origin and continuity of meaning. She is interested in using cinematic forms to explore the derivation of instinctive human rituals & objects. In 2022 she completed a fellowship at LABA Laboratory for Jewish Culture, where she spent a year creatively interrogating ancient mythological texts. She is a forthcoming resident at Squeaky Wheel Film & Media Art Center, where she will continue working on her hybrid short, Container Film. Dena teaches and participates in the cinema-arts workshops at Mono No Aware. She received her formal education from the Purchase College Conservatory of Theater Arts, with a concentration in Directing and the Integrated Media Arts MFA at Hunter College.

## mass noun, WIP $\bf 4$ min 16MM to DIGITAL by JORDAN CAROOMPAS

There was the color red, and then there was snowneither will last forever. A poem written with film,
"mass noun" comes from a fascination with winter
and the arguably obsolete Ice Ladders found in
Brooklyn's Prospect Park. It is the first film in
a series of experiments in speculative writing,
documentary, sculpture, and animation that consider
the ways changes in our environment elicit feelings
of both loss and wonder.

Jordan Caroompas (they/them) is a writer, musician, and animator/filmmaker living in Brooklyn, NY. Language, humor, considerations of climate and consumption, and the unexplainable/inexplicable are omni-present in Jordan's work, which is often hybrid in genre and medium. Their chapbook, Niu Fish, was a finalist for the 2021 Gold Line Press Fiction Chapbook Contest and was published by Bottlecap Press in August, 2022. Jordan is currently at work on an album cycle and their debut novel. Jordan has been involved with MONO as a student since 2021 and also teaches the Intro to 16mm course.

#### Jonmodiin | জন্মদিন, WIP 3 min 16MM to DIGITAL by NASHWA ZAMAN

Using home video footage and 16mm film, filmmaker Nashwa Zaman contemplates family, diaspora and her birthday.

Nashwa is an artist, filmmaker, performer and arts community facilitator based in NYC.

#### Thời Thơ ấu, 2022 7 min. 16MM to DIGITAL by VI TUONG BUI

Thời Thơ ấu explores my understanding of my bố mẹ as people outside of their roles as my parents through looking at how they dream for their late parents and homeland as former refugees of the US War in Vietnam / Vietnam War. What concessions will I need to make to begin to see my parents as expansive individuals? What will I gain from embracing them in their fullness?

I collected their dreams, stories, and memories using 16mm and Vietnamese and in my childhood home in Annandale, Virginia and Queens, New York. Vietnamese is the mother tongue of my parents, but English is the language I know myself by. We spoke in Vietnamese for the making of this film, and I slowly translated their words to English.

#### Deprivation, 2022 16MM FILM WITH OPTICAL SOUND -CAITY ARTHUR & CHANDLER ARTHUR

Just a year after losing their partner, Chuck is still battling nightmares and paranoia, leading them to believe that what appears in the shadows is all in their mind. They quite quickly find themself unable to explain the unusual hauntings and surreal visions that seem to keep intervening. Are these delusions of sleep paralysis a product of repressed grief, or are they actually real? Centered on the repercussions of trauma, Deprivation asks what limitations there are when it comes to blurring reality from personal fear.

CAITY ARTHUR (they/them) is a director, analog filmmaker, SFX artist, and experimental photographer with a focus on clown drag and horror. Some of their most recent projects include directing videos for the artist Junglepussy, supporting her on a North American tour alongside Tame Impala, in addition to their work editing and producing at Vice Media (and previously for Condé Nast). As a filmmaker, their work is influenced stylistically by Japanese and European horror films where narratives often intersect with fantasy and domesticity. Like their first short, a vampire horror film (LILITH) set in present day, DEPRIVATION explores the psychological effects of holding onto trauma from their perspective.

CHANDLER ARTHUR (b. 1994, New Jersey - She/Her/They) is an illustrator and graphic designer based in Chicago, Illinois. Her multi-layered practice, which focuses on

themes of femininity, power, and individuality is expressed through her vibrant illustrations and colorful character design. Her work primarily showcases women of color and creates empathetic narratives inspired by her lived experiences. Her work has been featured with RAW Artists Showcases and Braided Magazine, and has worked with Def Jam Records (2020); Walker Nickel Design (2020); Ace Hotel Chicago (2021); Jukebox Collective (2021); and Junglepussy.



Optical sound exhibition prints were timed, printed and developed by our partners ColorLab, MD.

#### Stepping Into The Frame, 2022 16MM TRIPLE PROJECTION PERFORMANCE by LAUREN NOELLE OLIVER

Stepping into the frame, by Lauren Noelle Oliver, is an intimate glance into the artist's paradoxical self-portraiture practice. Best known for her still photographic work, Oliver now turns her gaze to her process. Through the use of a 16mm bolex, the artist has opened her self-portraits beyond the moment of capture, allowing viewers into her unique process. Oliver often meticulously pre-plans each of her shots but, because she must step out of the frame to reset the camera between each image, it is impossible for her to recreate each scene exactly. Viewers are brought to a better understanding of the ephemeral nature of Oliver's photography and the fluidity and freedom behind her portraits.

Lauren Noelle Oliver is a New York City-based multidisciplinary artist who uses photography, filmmaking and performance to explore her multicultural identity. She holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in photography from SUNY Purchase. Her photographs have been featured on i-D, Buzzfeed, F-stop Magazine, and The Luupe. Her first monograph, "Temple of the Self", published by Monolith Editions in 2020, is in the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art and the Thomas J. Watson Library at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Lauren works between the Gowanus Community Darkroom and the International Center of Photography where she teaches and helps coordinate educational programming.

STEPPING INTO THE FRAME was commissioned by and received full production support from MONO NO AWARE. The film was captured by the artist using a Rex-5 Bolex Camera & Crystal-sync motor on 16mm color film supplied by the organization. Exhibition prints were timed, printed and developed by our partners at ColorLab, MD. The film was edited on a 4-plate Steenbeck flatbed editing table, spliced with a CIRO Guillotine Splicer, and test performances were run at the MONO NO AWARE Micro-cinema.




#### **Muybridge Deconstructed: 16mm to Still Image**



fidelity. It asks whether the revelatory
nature of the Quran rests solely in
its semantic content, or if revelation
can be experienced on account of
connections, collisions between letters,
between sounds.
